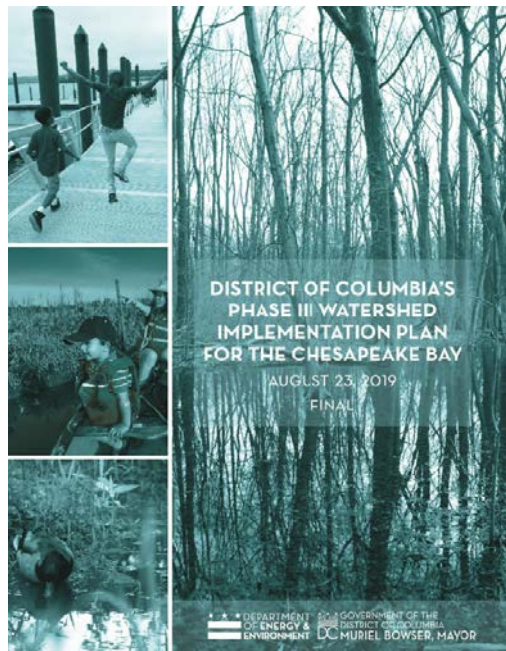

Kingman and Heritage Islands

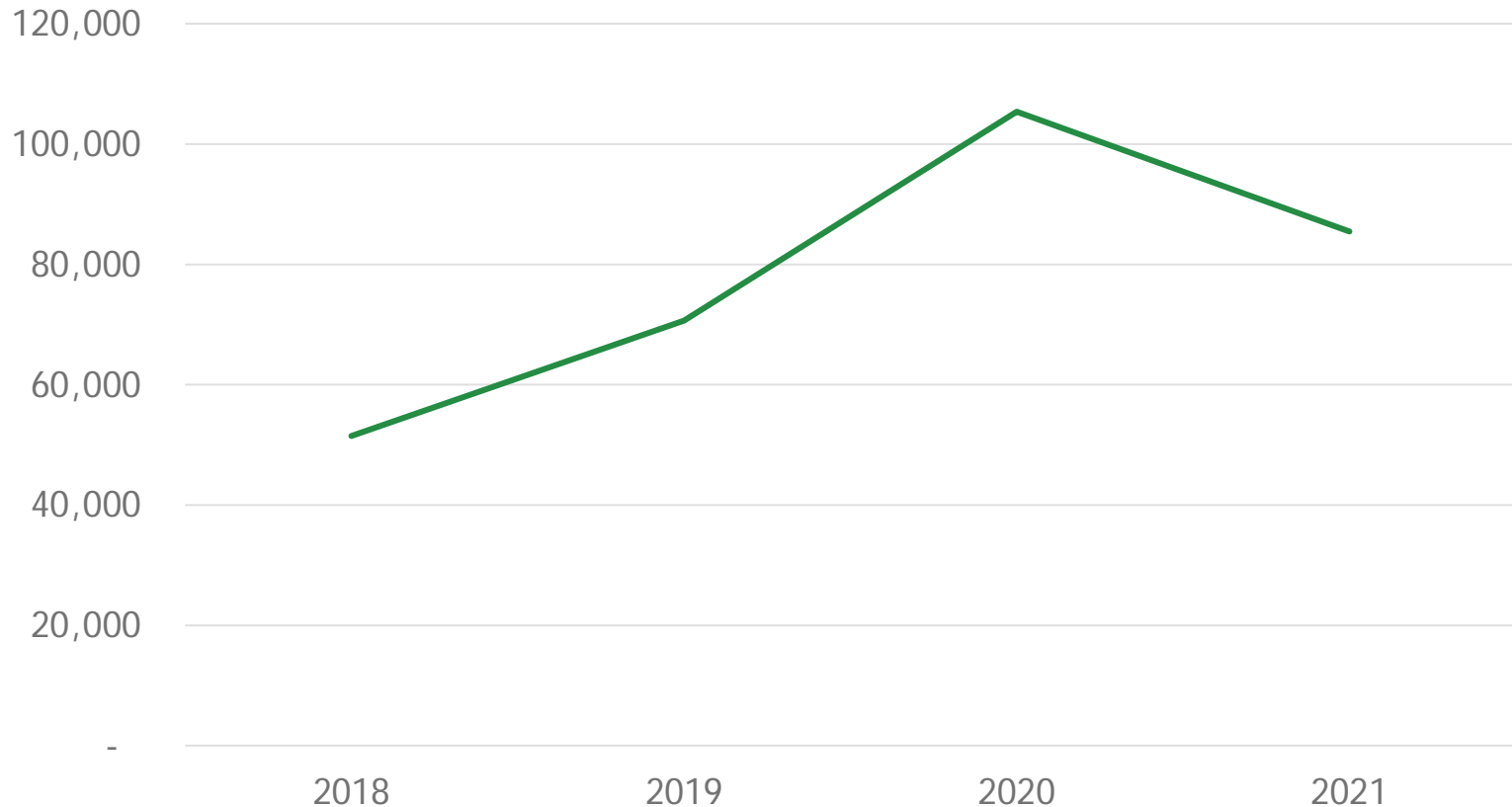

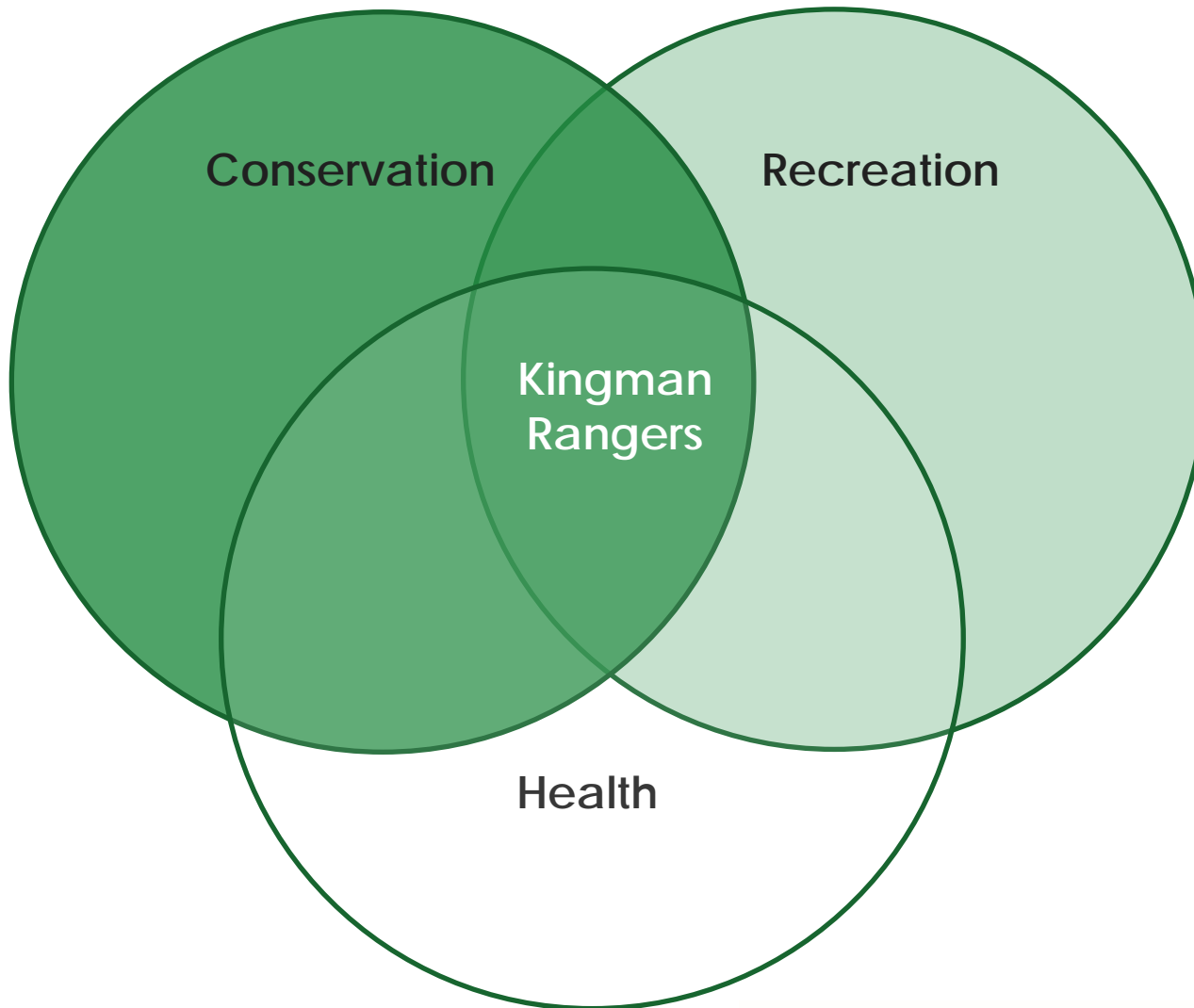

The Challenge



Crafting a Recovery Strategy



- Focus on transition to a green economy
- Extend and expand successful pilot program
- Connect to project-based learning at DC high schools
- Train and employ adult and seasonal Rangers
- Full-time and seasonal
- Mayor Bowser committed \$714k from the District's American Rescue Plan Act funds over 3 years

Rangers Program Timeline



- 2019 first run as an adult workforce development program with 3 participants
 - 2 placed in jobs (DCPS and Landscaping)
 - 1 stayed on full time and is still here
- 2020 pandemic shutdown halted in-person programming
- 2021 pilot for Jr Rangers Program for High School Students in Partnership with DOES

Education Connection



- DCPS relationships made the Jr. Rangers pilot program possible, and those partnerships were built largely through funding from MWEE grants such as B-WET and Community Stormwater Solutions
- These grants helped us fund programs to teach students hands-on environmental lessons both in schools and at Kingman and Heritage Islands

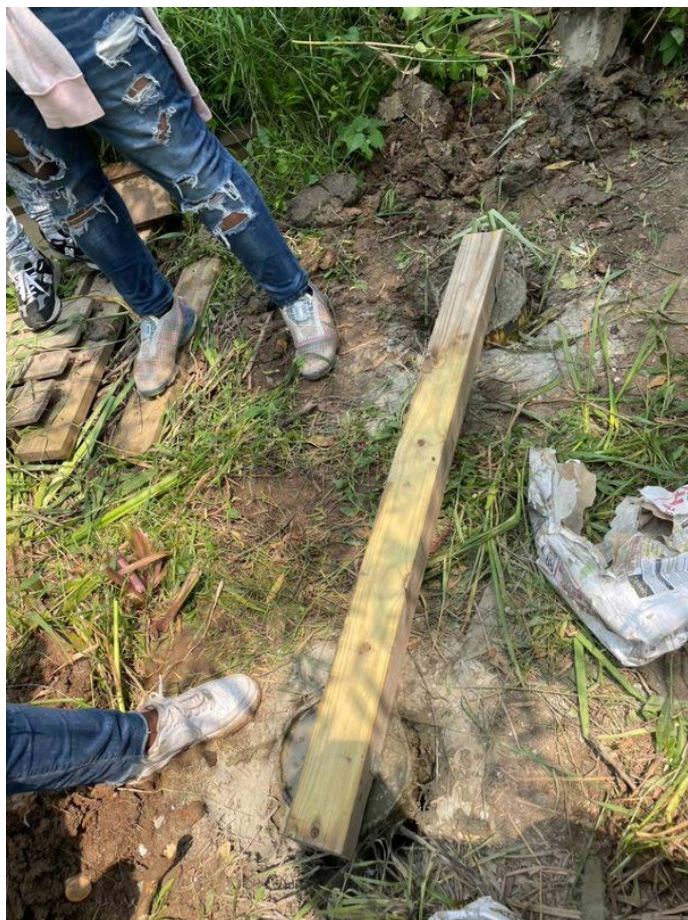
DOEE Rangers Grant Vision

- 3 Additional Full Time Rangers
- 4 Workforce Development Rangers with a focus on returning citizen through District Department of Employment Services Project Empowerment
- 10 Jr. Rangers
- Jobs stay in DC, targeted recruitment in wards 5, 6, 7 and 8 largely in response to the community's call for jobs
